What We Do

With the sales from donated goods and through Industrial Services, Goodwill NWUP is able to assist people with disabilities and other barriers to employment by providing job skills training and employment opportunities through partnerships with several community agencies.

Programs we partner with:

Work Programs: Individuals with income, employment, and educational disadvantages may be eligible for subsidized programs that help train individuals for a job, or to gain work experience that will potentially lead to permanent employment.

Community Service

Alternate Sentencing Program:

Individuals who have been court ordered to complete a specified number of hours of community work as an alternate to incarceration or to satisfy terms of probation, parole, or other justice related programs.
